Adverb of Manner with Example Sentences

Adverbs of manner mainly modify verbs and tell us the way in which something occurs. Adverbs of manner form the largest group of adverbs.

Example Sentences

- She sings **well**.
- She walked **quickly**.
- He spoke **softly**.
- Liam coughed **loudly** to attract her concentration.
- Olivia plays the flute **beautifully**.
- Noah ate the cake **greedily**.
- Emma ate the chocolate cake **greedily**.
- She **greedily** ate the chocolate cake.
- They gave us the money **generously**.
- Charlotte **generously** gave me the money.
- Oliver **quickly** agreed to re-type the report.
- He agreed **quickly** to re-type the report.
- He agreed to re-type the report **quickly**.
- Amelia **quietly** asked me to leave the car.
- Ava asked me **quietly** to leave the car.
- Sophia asked me to leave the house **quietly**.
- Elijah **gently** woke the sleeping girl.
- James **angrily** slammed the window.
- **Slowly** he picked up the book.
- **Roughly** she grabbed his arm.
- They **nervously** opened the gift box.
- She **angrily** left the room.
- The old lady **gently** carried the baby in her hands.
- We **clearly** won the toss.
- It landed **softly** on the carpet.
- It landed on the rug **softly**.
- We waited **patiently** until 10.30 pm.
- Isabella slept **soundly** despite the noise outside.

Adverb of Frequency with Example Sentences

Adverbs of Frequency tell the rate at which something is accomplished. Common adverbs of frequency include: Again, Now, Soon, Then, Today, Tonight, usually, Weekly, and Yearly.

EXAMPLE SENTENCES

- This incubator turns each egg **hourly**.
- They take a vacation at least once **annually**.
- She usually shops for groceries on Saturday **evenings**.
- Olivia is **often** late for school.
- She **seldom** sees John.
- My dentist told me I should floss thrice **daily**.
- She **always** waits for him, but he does not even care.
- Liam **often** goes abroad for official duties.
- However, they also go on parks **regularly**.
- We go to China **once** a month.
- He went to Germany many times **before**.
- But I never went to Pakistan in **my life**.
- They go out to watch a movie every **Sunday night**.
- We **rarely** went to watch a concert.
- Plays are **mostly** dull.
- **Once** I fell asleep in the class.
- They travel **once** a year to refresh our minds.
- We **hardly** get some free time.
- Both of us have jobs, and we have to work **every day**.
- We take an extended vacation at least once **annually**.
- We **usually** go shopping on Sunday mornings.
- Most tech companies pay taxes **yearly**.
- The sweeper checks the toilets **every hour**.
- The manager meets **weekly** to review improvements.
- I **usually** have cereal for lunch.
- I **usually** go to the park.
- They **often** surf the internet.
- I sometimes forget my husband's **birthday**.
- We **occasionally** eat junk food.
- Amelia **seldom** reads the newspaper.
- I never swim in the river.
- Facebook is **occasionally** frustrating.
- He was **always** noisy.

Adverb of Time with Example Sentences

Adverbs of time modify verbs and inform us when action occurs. It tells us how long and how much time an action occurs.

Example Sentences

- Aurora went to the bar **yesterday**.
- Parker is going to tidy my room **tomorrow**.
- I saw a snake **today**.
- She will call him **later**.
- They have to read **now**.
- Addison stayed in the Bears' house **all day**.
- My uncle lived in Japan **for a year**.
- We have been going to this university **since 2020**.
- I stayed in Australia **for five days**.
- Adam is going on vacation **for a month**.
- She has **been** riding horses **for a year**.
- He has not seen her **since** Sunday.
- Harrison has **been** working here **since** 2010.
- I **often** eat vegetables.
- We **never** drink milk.
- I am **seldom** late.
- Alice **rarely** lies.
- Josephine is **still** waiting for you.
- Madeline might **still** want some money.
- Do they **still** work for the NY Times?
- Is she **still** here?
- He is **still** hungry.
- I went to the hospital **yesterday**.
- Kaylee will go to her home **tomorrow**.
- Maxwell completed his graduation **last year**.
- Finn is going to the park **now**.
- She searched for him **for a year**.
- Olivia has been doing social work **since** 1998.
- Logan never pays his rent **on time**.
- It **often** rains in the village.
- Emma should **always** be polite.
- Lucas **seldom** talks.

Adverb of Place with Example Sentences

The adverbs of place inform about the location where the verb's action occurs. Common adverbs of place include: **Abroad, Across, Ahead, Anywhere, Back, Backwards, there, nearby, and below.**

EXAMPLE SENTENCES

- Put the book **there**.
- After a long day at work, they headed **homewards**.
- Please bring that car **here**.
- My grandmother's house is **nearby**.
- Olivia went to Japan **yesterday**.
- Liam will stay **there** for ten days.
- Noah will stay at **Hotel Travis**.
- It is situated in **New York**.
- He did not go **there** with her.
- I work at **Microsoft Corporation**.
- My school is in **Central Park**.
- Central Park is situated in **Lahore**.
- However, he stays at the office **most of the time**.
- I will attend the meeting at **my office**.
- I feel comfortable working in **my office**.
- **Sometimes** I go abroad for a job.
- Emma also went to **many places** with him.
- But **this time**, Benjamin could not go **there** with her.
- Once, we stayed in **Bali** for seven days.
- They visited Tajmahal in **Agra**.
- We went to Florida and stayed **there** for seven days.
- They came back to **America** with many adventures.
- The tree is **down** the river.
- We looked around the **hospital**.
- Our village is **south** of here.
- He walked **north**.
- They're going **east**.
- Charlotte is wearing a necklace **around her neck**.
- William made his way carefully **down** the cliff.
- She dropped the letter in the **mailbox**.
- I'm going **back home**.
- We built a house **nearby**.
- Amelia took the child **outside**.
